Dear Dr. Learner:

Thank you for your recent message concerning the school prayer amendment.

The First Amendment to the Constitution provides that "Congress shall make no law respecting the establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." Voluntary prayer does not constitute an infringement of the First Amendment. The Establishment clause does not require that the public sector be completely isolated from all things which have religious significance or origin. It is clear that the authors of the Constitution and Bill of Rights sought only to prohibit Congress from establishing a national church or limiting the free exercise of religion.

As you may know, I have consistently voted to permit voluntary prayer in public schools. It has appeared over-whelmingly obvious from my discussions with and messages from Kentuckians that they widely support some form of amendment allowing school prayer. After careful consideration of all issues involved, I made the decision to support S. J. Res. 73, the President's amendment. This amendment was voted on by the Senate on March 20, 1984, and defeated by a vote of 56 to 44. A two-thirds majority vote was required to amend the Constitution.

I appreciate the time you have taken to share your concerns and views with me on this important issue. I realize that it is a very controversial and emotional one, and respect your opinion just as I hope you will respect mine. Though we may differ on this particular matter, I do hope that you will continue to keep me informed of your views.

We hope that Rabbi Stephen Wylen of Cong. B'nai Sholom in Huntington gives us permission to run this excerpt from his bulletin of last month.* It is "YIDDISHKEIT" at its strongest and tells us as Jews how we can all make a difference. We hope that the Chanukah holiday made it possible for us all to remember the sacrifices that were made so that we could enjoy religious freedom.

As chanukah approaches, we are thrilled by the example of the brave Maccabees, who fought against all odds in defense of Judaism. Their bravery seems to us a symbol of the military bravery of modern Jews who have fought to defend Israel and in the Allied armies against the Nazis. We are proud of the rediscovered ability of Jews to fight for our existence. On top of the ethical traits of a Jew, such as generosity and forgiveness, we proudly add military bravery.

For centuries there were no Jews in arms. During those centuries, Jews displayed a form of bravery more subtle but no less significant—moral bravery. We suffered at the hands of oppressors without letting them crush our will to exist in the integrity of our own way of life. The Jews who established schools within the Warsaw Chetto were, in their own way, brave fighters for Judaism.

We American Jews need not take up arms in defense of our people, nor need we display courage in the face of oppression. To be a Jew in America requires a different kind of bravery—a bravery more subtle, more difficult, more rare than military heroism or moral resolution. We must, to survive as Jews in the oversheoming secular culture of America, display the courage to be individuals.

To be a Jew is to be different from everybody else. Are we brave enough to risk it?

All people say, "Don't classify me. Think of me as an individual." But, to really be an individual, that is something else. We have names for real individuals—"NUT", "ECCENTRIC", or the unkindest cut of a-l--"JUST DOESN'T FIT IN."

A schoolchild is mortified if his pants are different from what his classmates are wearing. How many children have the courage to dress according to their own taste? Adults are no less susceptible to pressures to act and be loke our peers, to do the "right" things in the "right" places.

How much daring it takes, then, to be different in faith, in culture, in celebration! How few can summon this courage, to be a Jew at all times, in all places!!These are the Maccabees of our time, the bravest defenders of the Jewish heritage. May we be counted in their number!!
